155 artisans, many of national recognition, will demonstrate techniques of traditional craftsmanship.

Federal brick houses, spacious Victorian homes, simple Quaker buildings and small log structures—gardens, barns, Civil War and Quaker cemeteries, an old mill and a one-room schoolhouse are open during the Fair.

Three floors of juried handcrafts for sale in a restored brick mill. Vintage barns transformed into galleries for paintings, sketches, photographs and dried flowers. The Country Store offers homemade breads, cookies, handblown glassware and the Waterford tote bag.

A Revolutionary War militia camps in Waterford. Fife and drum corps march through the narrow streets. Civil War soldiers reenact a past battle. And there will be music everywhere—string bands, troubadours, barbershop, gospel, symphony, folk, traditional.

Many of our crafts demonstrations will especially delight children who might help make a pot or a special bookmark, be enchanted by a magician or mesmerized by a mime, or ride a country wagon filled with hay.





Waterford welcomes you.

Enter the village of Waterford and step back in time. During the Fair you will have the unique opportunity to visit some of the homes in the village. Glimpse how contemporary people live in historic structures, many with the original detailing and period furnishings.

Waterford was settled in 1733 by Amos Janney, a Quaker from Bucks County, Pennsylvania. He built a mill on Catoctin Creek and, as other settlers followed, Waterford became a commercial center. When the railroad and major highways by-passed Waterford, its commercial importance declined, and Waterford became a quiet village where little modernization took place.

The entire village and surrounding fields were designated a National Historic Landmark in 1970. On this, our 65th anniversary, the Foundation is devoted to saving the rural character of the historic landmark for future generations.



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Getting here:

From Washington, DC: Beltway to Rt. 267 (Dulles Toll Road). Stay on Rt. 267 (Greenway) to Leesburg. Left exit to Rt. 7 west to Rt. 9 go .25 mile to traffic light and turn right on Rt. 662 (Clark's Gap Road) to Waterford. Follow directions for parking.

From Baltimore: Rt. 70 west to Rt. 15 south over the bridge into Virginia. Continue 3 miles on Rt. 15 into Lucketts. At the traffic light, turn right on Rt. 662 (Stumptown Road) through farmland to the dead end at Loyalty Road. Turn left on Loyalty Road and follow into Waterford. Follow directions for parking.
